RAPPORT DÉTAILLÉ SUR DES POINTS CULMINANTS

DETAILED REPORT ON HIGHLIGHTS

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The United States of America members of all types to the National Committee continue to be very proactive and make every effort to attend meetings in other countries. There is a high level of expertise and interest in all areas. A few highlights include:

TC Highlights

TC 1.1 Working on Integrity **Toolkit**: Noted "the provided case studies must cover anti-corruption tools used already in some countries outside the PIARC toolkit as well, to allow a comparison." To that end, WG3 is prepared to produce an integrity toolkit report to include a summary of certain aspects from the survey as well as case studies from other countries using anti-corruption tools and measures.

Role of Media: WG3 is prepared to produce a second report using the framework presented by SANRAL on "Media's influence in shaping perceptions of fraud, waste and abuse in transport and road administrations" as well as general practice case examples. Produce article on Recovery Act for WRA Routes/Roads for publication next summer. NC-USA members of TC 1.1 working with AASHTO and TRB to jointly host a TC 1.1 meeting in the United States during the TRB International Conference on Performance Management (in early 2015). Working Group 2 (WG2). Focuses on Performance Management within road administrations. (Working Group 1) is focused on Organizational structures of road administrations (Connie Yew, FHWA and Mara Campbell, MO)

- TC 1.2 Much of the financing of road systems is dedicated to the activities of its established subcommittees. Both sub-committees are involved in funding and financing but with different approaches. Group 1.2.1 is addressing funding strategies for a sustainable road system and sub-committee 1.2.2 is researching private sector financing. On March 13th most of the Technical Committee members attended a day long symposium related to financing major projects that provided members with additional insight and information. (Mike Patterson, OK)
- TC 1.3 Two meetings were held in 2013. Surveys were developed by three working groups on (1) Boundary Conditions for Transport Strategies for Climate Change Mitigation and Adaptation; (2) Tools for Understanding Climate Change Mitigation; and (3) Appraisal of Sustainability of Transport Infrastructure Plans. At its second meeting in Seoul, Korea October 30-31, the TC discussed the progress of the surveys. TC 1.3 developed and submitted a proposal for a Special Project to the PIARC Executive Council this year on the development of an international framework for climate change adaptation. (April Marchese, FHWA)
- TC 1.4 TC 1.4 met in Bergisch Gladbach, Germany in March, 2013 focusing on the Ex-Ante and Ex-Post Benefit Cost Analysis of Highway Investments. The meeting included over 20 representatives from 15 different counties – both those with developed and developing highway networks. Presentations on Ex-Ante evaluation focused on measuring resilience, linking to macroeconomic outcomes and communications. Presentations on Ex-Post evaluation focused on uses of benefit cost analysis, outcomes from poor road management, and comparison of projected and realized benefits and costs. Karen White, US representative, presented the Ex-Post benefit cost analysis capture and reported in the Status of the Nation's Highways, Bridges, and Transit: Conditions and Performance Report. (Karen White, FHWA)

TC Highlights

- TC 1.5 Presentations by James Lambert, UVA (academia/corresponding and sole NCUSA member for TC 1.5, co-chairs WG1 on role of risky assessment in policy development and decision making) on radiological disaster prepared of highways in the US national capital region and risky management of land development affecting highway corridors and other applications of risky management. (James Lambert, UVA)
- TF 2 This group is focusing on several broad items e.g. best practices in road security, creating a network of road security experts within the PIARC network, developing a security planning tool, maintaining a focus within PIARC and considering other countries' points of view. Developing a workshop for 2014 addressing three broad areas: threats, identifying vulnerabilities and criticalities, and security by design. (Steve Ernst, FHWA)
- TC 2.2 PIARC Technical Committee 2.2 discussed the Progress on its Work Plan in Providence on May 3rd and 4th in conjunction with the 2013 AASHTO Spring meeting. The fifteen members who attended the meeting were divided into two subgroups. Each group proceeded to further develop their work plans, including setting objectives, selecting possible case studies, finalizing surveys and the work schedules. The draft survey results for Issue 2.2.1 (Comparison of Strategies for Sustainable Mobility) and 2.2.2 (Design of Transport Infrastructure for MultiMobility in Urban Areas) will be discussed at the meeting in Buenos Aires (to be held in conjunction with ITS Argentina) in November 2013. The draft reports will be finalized in mid to late 2014. (Dilip Mundkur, BES Inc., Harlan Miller, FHWA, and Janet Oakley, AASHTO)
- TC 2.3 TC 2.3 Freight Transport continues to advance it's research initiatives for this cycle. The focus of the TC 2.3 working groups is to address two key issues: Freight Management and Co-modality for Freight Transport, more specifically: Study the overall system of interurban / urban freight management, considering the influence of logistics strategies on: delivery models and road freight transport, overnight transport, dangerous goods transport, road access and guidance control, terminals and transfer stations, truck parking and security. Investigate truck management strategies and measures to improve the economic and environmental efficiency of road freight (including noise reduction); and Investigate how the concept of co-modality is implemented with the objective of an optimal use of the different modes of transport for freight. Identify the initiatives, objectives, results and obstacles. Analyse, in particular, the outcomes regarding modal shift of freight transport from roads to other modes. (William Gardner, MN; Teresa Adams, University of Wisconsin-Madison)
- TC 2.4 This winter service TC is focusing on the Winter Road Congress Andorra, February 2014. Two meetings have been conducted this year with success since the TC has utilized the PIARC WebEx to allow TC members not in attendance to participate. The first meeting in Santiago, Chile provided a seminar on "Winter Operation at High Altitude and Extreme Zones. At the second meeting a majority of the meeting was devoted to details for WRC-Andorra. 187 complete papers have been selected out of 233 abstracts offered. A brief was given to the AASHTO SICOP-WMPST and Highways Subcommittee on Maintenance meeting in Vermont by Nelson. TC 2.4 was asked to participate at the Winter Maintenance Peer Review in September in Vancouver, Canada on the "Top 10 Things that Define a World Class Winter Maintenance Program" with great feedback. The TC will continue in this project. (Richard Nelson, NV)

TC Highlights

- TC 2.5 TC 2.5 (Rural Roads) met in Rome, Italy Thursday, May 16 through Friday, May 17 of 2013. A questionnaire was distributed prior to the meeting concerning the status of rural roads in each country, funding situations, funding opportunities and status of construction and maintenance issues. The results of the questionnaire were tallied and assembled in Rome and the outcomes were discussed at our committee meeting. Apparently maintenance of rural roads is a major issue in most of the countries represented on our committee. Funding for construction seems to be available through various international means but the smaller countries are left to fund their own maintenance activities, often at a lower level than desired. Several presentations were given regarding how transportation officials are creatively dealing with this issue, including work and training programs for local people to assist with maintenance activities. TC 2.5 meets again in Durban, South Africa November 25-29, 2013. (Melinda McGrath, MI and Jocelyn Pritchett, Pritchett Engr & Planning, LLC)
- TC 3.1 This group continues to provide input to the Road Safety Manual development. Survey on safety and land use policies was requested from several participation PIARC countries. They have received responses from the U.S. and Canada and awaiting responses from Malaysia and looking for a Latin country case study preferrably from Argentina. (Robert Hull, UT and Rob Ritter, FHWA)
- TC 3.2 Complete a search of research driver distraction and fatigue. This phase consisted in a literature search and review of pertinent documentation as to the human factor. This first phase was recently completed prior to the recent Poland meeting, which allowed for the draft development of the general issues for the cause and effect of driver distraction and fatigue. The next phase is to develop specific strategies that a designer will be able to use to address these issues. (Keith Cota, NH)
- TC 4.4 Committee met during the Paris meeting in May 2013. The committee is continuing work on the use of natural materials which are locally available at the site of the road project and categorized as unacceptable in their existing conditions to comply with technical specifications for earthworks. As part of this, the committee has sent out a survey on the Optimal Use of Local Materials in Earthworks. I am currently providing the input from my knowledge of US practice in this area. (Silas Nichols, FHWA)
